

Syllabus: "Academic Reading"

International School, Summer Semester 2023/24 Dr. Fernanda Korovsky Moura

(a) Inhalt und Ansatz | Content and Approach

- The course is designed to prepare students to approach different texts in an academic context. We will explore the four levels of reading (Elementary, Inspectional, Analytical and Syntopical), and investigate different reading techniques to achieve the highest level of engaging with an academic text (skimming, active reading, note-making, outlining, criticizing, aids to reading, etc.). We will also focus on the use of English in academic contexts through vocabulary exercises.
- Students require at least an upper-advanced level of English in order to follow the lessons.
- Teaching methods are oriented towards student-centred learning and include activities such as lectures, group work, peer review, and consultations with the instructor.
- The course will be offered as an online session.
- Completion of assignments and regular attendance (at least 80% of all sessions) is required for exam admission.
- For the successful completion of the course, the student will be awarded 3 ECTS. Therefore, students should be prepared to spend considerable time working with the study content.
- It is recommended (though not obligatory) to attend this course alongside the "Academic Writing" course offered at the International School.

- The course aims at improving students' reading comprehension in an academic context.
- o Students will become familiar with various extensive and selective reading techniques.
- Students will enhance their academic vocabulary.
